

FINDING HOPE IN THE CARE OF CREATION

A Rocha is a global family of conservation organisations working together to live out God's calling to care for creation and equip others to do likewise. A Rocha, which means "the rock" in Portuguese, was founded in Portugal in 1983. https://arocha.org.uk

On Sunday October 29th for our special ECO themed service we have a speaker from A Rocha UK, Professor Colin Beale.

'Colin Beale is a trustee of the Christian Conservation Charity A Rocha UK and is a Professor of Ecology at the University of York. As well as writing and publishing on a wide range of topics in conservation science, he has worked in practical conservation in Lebanon, Portugal and the UK. He lives in York with his family, is a member of the village church and enjoys being outside with a pair of binoculars and a lot of birds!'

Our church is currently working with A Rocha to become an Eco church. This involves examining all parts of our church life from heating efficiency of our buildings to the food we serve in the Café. We know we cannot keep using up the earth's resources without thought. We are warming the atmosphere by our actions and causing wildfires and floods elsewhere in the world making life much harder for many people.

Surely the problem is too large, what difference can we make?

Global warming is being made worse by lots of people doing lots of small things that don't show care for our planet. However, if we all do small things to help our planet, we will collectively make a big difference.

On the windowsill in church, you will find a book labelled **Just One Thing** (real title 'How bad are bananas?') DON'T TRY TO READ IT ALL – dip in for 5 minutes. Find lots of interesting things you never knew – and ways you can make a difference. Borrow it for a few days or read it in the Café. If you have ideas how we can make a difference in church, speak out!

We help children and young people grow confidence and make theatre exciting, accessible and adventurous.'

BRAVE WORDS are to perform a play called **MUTTON** and one of their performances will be based at Stainbeck – **Wednesday 22nd November.**

This is their exciting new three-part theatre and performance project telling the story of Mary Bateman – Leeds most famous witch and conwoman. Mutton is a dark comedy exploring the life and times of the Yorkshire Witch. How the desperation of ordinary folk in the early 1800's is paralleled today. The dangers we face by trying to grasp a little more control over our lives.

1809 – Mary Bateman is about to be hung for witchcraft and murder. Only one of those things is illegal. Her career of crime has included fake identities, magic charms, poisoned pudding, a holy hen, drunk watchmen, a fire at the mill and – of course – a freshly shaved leg of MUTTON.
